## Principal's Report

Term 1 has been very busy and I would like to commend the majority of students for ensuring we have had a great start to the school year. Welcome to all our new students and particularly our Year 7 students, it is fantastic to have you all a part of the Balga SHS Our enrolments are steady at 604 community. students and this is a pleasing trend. attendance levels, for the majority of students are pleasing but across the school this remains an area where we are going to focus energy to achieve further improvement. For students to be able to achieve expected progress levels, a rate of 90% attendance is required. Once a student's attendance falls below this level, it becomes very difficult for them to progress at the desired rate. Our Attendance and Engagement team (Mr Craig Webster and Mr Dave Pascal) have conducted many home visits during this term to assist families improve student attendance and this will continue into Term 2. Please remember that parents and carers are required to notify the school of the reasons for any absences.

I would like to acknowledge the great achievement attained by our F1 program team in qualifying at the end of last year for the national finals that were held in Balga SHS was the only Melbourne recently. government school in Western Australia to make the finals in this highly competitive event. Mr Samuels and Ms Dean led the team to a very pleasing 18th place. The program is based around STEAM with a focus on engineering, design and all involved in the program spent a significant amount of time over weekends and after school preparing for this event. You all did Balga SHS very proud.

Each year we have students preparing to undertake testing programs in NAPLAN and OLNA. These tests can be quite challenging for students and our Year 10, 11 and 12 students have completed the first round of OLNA testing during the term. It is compulsory for all students to pass OLNA prior to finishing Year 12 (unless they already attained Band Level 8 in NAPLAN) for them to graduate with a WACE certificate. Our NAPLAN testing will take place in May next term and for the first time, this testing will be completed online by all students across Western Australia.

Staff have been preparing students for this testing and this will continue in the early part of next term. I wish all students involved in this testing well. I would also like to remind parents and carers that these tests represent only one aspect of assessments that students complete that go towards the grades they earn across Learning Areas.

Our School Board continues to support the operations of our school and indeed provide governance regarding our operations. Our School Board meets oncer per term and our Chair from last year Ms Jenny Motou has provided great leadership during her three-year tenure. Jenny has decided to not renominate for the Chair role in 2019, although she remains on the Board and Mr Ross McLean was voted in as Chair by the Board at our Term 1 meeting. We thank Jenny for her tireless support and welcome Ross into this very important role. As part of our requirements to have a functional school Board, we are required to conduct parent and staff representative elections this year and information regarding how to nominate for the Board together with information on how the election process unfolds will be provided during the first week of next term. encourage all members of the Balga SHS community to consider nominating for a place on our Board for 2019.

Volunteers continue to be such an important part of our school community and we have them supporting our students in so many ways including Breakfast Club, classroom and sporting teams support, community projects, camps and excursions. We thank all our volunteers for their outstanding efforts in supporting our students.

We farewelled some staff at the end of last year and I would like to welcome a new staff member that has come on board this term. Ms Brown is a new member of our Home Economics team, she has come to us from Albany SHS.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all staff across the school for their outstanding efforts in providing our students with the best education possible through the learning experiences they have planned and delivered to our students. They work extremely hard and I am sure they are all looking forward to a regenerating break at the end of this term in readiness for a very busy Term 2.

Students also have worked hard this term, and I am sure they are looking forward to the end of term break too. I hope all students stay safe and healthy over the break and come back in Term 2 ready to work hard and make further progress in their studies.

## **OLNA**

What happens if I don't achieve band 8 in my Year 9 NAPLAN Numeracy?

If you do not achieve band 8 in NAPLAN Numeracy you will be required to attempt the OLNA online Numeracy Assessment. It is designed to enable students to successfully meet the Western Australian Certificate of Education (WACE) requirement of demonstrating the minimum standard of literacy and numeracy.

Year 9 students will commence OLNA preparation during Term 4 by attending the support class once a week after school during homework classes. This will continue throughout Years 10, 11 and 12 or until they achieve a category 3 in OLNA Numeracy.

## **Australian Mathematics Competition**

Interested students have been invited to participate in the Australian Mathematics Competition run by Mr Quirin Sappl and Mrs S Mioduszewski. The Australian Mathematics Competition has been a success the last two years. All through Semester 1 many of our students will be attending practice sessions during lunch periods to become accustomed to the types of questions being asked.

## **Term News**

Our focus this term is on the "Number and Algebra" strand. All students were assigned to either Mathspace or Mathletics (for Intensive English Centre students). Using Mathspace, staff could easily track student's progress. Within the different learning year groups, there has been a collection of classwork which has been proudly displayed in the front foyer of the school. This gives staff the opportunity of showcasing the explicit teaching being used in their classrooms whilst covering the NUMBER and ALBEGRA strand.

## F1 in School - STEM

## Team Raptors go to Melbourne

On Sunday March 10, Phu, Jackson, William and Khan all members of Raptors, hopped on a plane and travelled to Melbourne, Victoria, where they met up with the fifth member of Team Raptors, Vy. She had moved to Melbourne just two weeks before the competition. When they arrived they were all set to compete in the National Finals for the F1 in Schools STEM Challenge. After competing in the WA State Finals of the F1 in Schools STEM Challenge in November 2018, the team received a 'Wildcard' entry to compete in the National Finals at BOSCH in Clayton Victoria.

The team spent the final few weeks of Term 4 in 2018. the January school holidays, many days after school and weekends busily preparing for the National Finals. They developed a portfolio outlining the team responsibilities and the major aspects of the project that they produced. Members of the team had different roles and responsibilities to develop various aspects for the competition. Some of these were using Autodesk Inventor to design a 3D model of an F1 race car, using an automated CNC router to manufacture the car out of Balsa wood, developing 3D designs to 3D print business card holders, pen holders and car components. They produced graphic designs for their team branding such as polo shirts, pens, business cards, water bottles and stickers. One of the team members designed and produced a trade display and prospectus to help secure sponsorship to assist them financially in getting them to the National Finals. They produced a portfolio outlining the processes in the engineering design of their F1 car, which included the testing of the car in a virtual wind tunnel.

During the competition Team Raptors made an oral presentation using PowerPoint to explain their work in completing all components for the competition to a panel of judges. They also had to give an oral presentation for the engineering processes describing the science behind the use of various design aspects to a different panel of judges who were experts in the field of engineering. The team raced their F1 car against other team cars for the fastest time. The team also spoke informally to judges about their reasoning for the design aspect, team branding and promotion of sponsor on their trade display. All aspects were given a rating to determine the winners and our students did very well in their presentations and in their racing.

On the final day the team got to experience the real world of F1 racing going to Albert park and spending a day at the Australian Grand Prix.

## **Student Services**

This year we continue our partnership with Headspace and have now broadened our Extended Services partnership to include Wungening Aboriginal Corporation and Yorgum Aboriginal Corporation. All three services attend the school each week for 1-2 days offering individual student counselling and group therapy workshops focusing on Resilience, Drug and Alcohol Education and Leadership Development.

# Balga SHS Transition & Engagement Program





Headspace is the National Youth Mental Health Foundation providing early intervention mental health services to 12-25 year olds, along with assistance in promoting young peoples' wellbeing. YouthBeyondBlue aims to equip young people with the knowledge and skills to maintain their own good mental health and wellbeing and to help recognize symptoms in people close to them. YouthLink is a Perth based service that assists young people, aged 13-24 years of age, who experience difficulties with their emotional or social well-being. You can also talk through any problems you may be having with your local Community Health Nurse, at Balga Senior High School Tuesday, Weds, Thurs. Remember, no matter how big or small your problem is, there is help available and it is important to seek help as soon as possible.

## **Building Resilience**

Resilience is the ability to cope with difficult situations and 'bounce back' when things go wrong. Young people need to develop resilience in order to navigate life's ups and downs. As a parent, you can help your child to become resilient by giving him or her opportunities to learn and practice new skills, for example:

Allow your child to solve some of their own problems. Learning to deal with issues builds skill and confidence. Don't jump in to fix things, unless the situation has got out of hand.

Arrange a fun, child-friendly activity each week like a trip to the park, play date with a friend or watching a favourite movie. Regular 'ups' provide a bank of positive emotions to buffer against life's 'downs' that may involve disappointment or conflict.

Help your kids to think positively. If your child is frustrated by a difficult math's problem, say, "I know that question was hard today, but yesterday I saw you solve a hard problem. You kept trying until you worked it out."

If you have a disagreement with your child, the most important thing to do is to reconnect and repair the relationship. Let your child cool down then offer a hug or words of support. This has benefits for your child's mental health as well as their ability to deal with relationship problems throughout their life.

## **Immunisation information for parents**

Immunisation programs in our community are designed to keep everyone well and safe, especially those people who are most at risk, such as babies.

Parents or legal guardians who make a conscious informed decision not to immunise their child should note the following:

-In the case of a Measles or Pertussis (whooping cough) outbreak, Western Australian schools are required by the Department of Health, to exclude students who have not received the appropriate vaccination.

Please make sure your school-aged child is fully immunised and that you have provided a copy of the AIR immunisation record to the school.

Did you know that as parents you can ring the National registry or visit <a href="www.humanservices.gov.au">www.humanservices.gov.au</a> to check out your child's immunisation status? #### Help your child be a non-smoker

**Set a good example by being a non-smoker**. If you have found quitting difficult and are still a smoker, tell your child how you feel about it.

Reinforce the non-smoking messages. Make your house and car smoke-free zones. Don't allow them to light cigarettes for yourself or others. If there are smokers in the house, keep cigarettes where children cannot access them. Discuss the issue of smoking with your child when you see others smoke.

Educate your children about the dangers of smoking. Explain the long-term risks but emphasize the immediate risks to their health and wellbeing (for example, bad breath, stained teeth and fingers and less money in their pocket). Explaining the long-term risks may not have much of an impact, as young people can find it difficult to imagine 20 or 30 years into the future.
